



Highlights from the NASW Social Work Pioneers® 2010 Luncheon

More than 100 NASW Social Work Pioneers® and their guests attended the 6th annual Pioneers' Event on October 23, 2010. The program was held in Washington, DC at the Cosmos Club through the sponsorship of club member Joan O. Weiss. It was the largest and most representative group that has attended the annual event to date, and the room was filled to capacity.

Bernice Catherine Harper served as Chair of the Pioneer Luncheon Program Planning Committee consisting of 12 NASW Pioneer volunteers. Pioneer steering Committee Co-Chair Betsy Vourlekis served as moderator for the morning program. NASW Foundation Director Robert Arnold brought greetings

Following the opening remarks, Juan Ramos announced the "Pioneers in Memoriam," remembering those Pioneers who have died during the past year. Patricia Martin-O'Meally introduced the 24 Pioneers newly elected in 2010, of whom ten attended with friends and family members.



On behalf of Pioneer Fundraising Chair, Jessie P. Smith, Robert Arnold reported on the current status of NASW Legacy and Pioneer funds at the NASW Foundation. The program listed the names of 63 donors to the Legacy and Pioneer programs throughout 2010. Thank you, all!



Bernice Harper introduced the first keynote speaker, Nancy Humphreys, DSW, ACSW, an NASW Past President and Founder and Director of the Nancy A. Humphreys Institute for Political Social Work at the University of

Connecticut School of Social Work. Dr. Humphreys gave a keynote address entitled, "The American Dream: Is it Obtainable and Sustainable in the Second Decade of the 21st Century?" The second keynote continued in the theme of a clear-eyed look at today's challenges, while envisioning a path to a more hopeful future. NASW Past President Dorothy Harris introduced the afternoon keynote speaker, Jeanette C. Takamura, PhD, MSW, Dean of the Columbia University School of Social Work.
